Reducing Storm Phobias in Dogs

With the recent spate of stormy weather, especially over much of Summer, we have had an high number of stray dogs brought into the clinic. These furry friends had escaped the backyard during storms.



Some dog breeds are more prone to developing noise phobias including Cattle Dogs, Kelpies, Border Collies or any other

herding breed where their sense of hearing is more acute. Tips for helping your dog during thunderstorms:

- If possible, keep your pet inside. Draw the blinds and close the windows and doors. Dogs with severe phobias have been known to smash through windows or climb out of their yards during storms
- Stay calm! Your dog will pick up on your anxiety simply

- from your body language.
- Play a game, or give them a super special treat or stuffed Kong to occupy them.
- You can try a calming collar—known as an Adaptil Collar. It releases synthetic calming pheromones to help soothe your dog when they are stressed.
- Thunder Shirts are a tight jacket you place on your dog and can have a calming effect. They have varying levels of success, and home made versions can be found online.
- Use desensitizing storm noise CD's as often as possible. Start playing them at very low levels, and reward your dog when they stay relaxed. Gradually increase the volume over time. These CD's can be purchased online, or contact the clinic.

Finally, in extreme circumstances where your pet's anxiety is so bad they may bring harm to themselves, sedatives can be prescribed. If you are worried your pet may require medication, please contact the clinic for further advice.

Hiccup and the Mysterious Attacker!

Hiccup belongs to one of our nurses Roxanne and was recently involved in a fight with a mysterious animal.

Roxy found Hiccup screaming in pain the day after the incident occurred. He was rushed to the clinic where Xrays were performed. There were no obvious wounds or broken bones, so Hiccup was sent home on extensive pain relief and cage rest.

Within 3 days of the initial visit, a strange smell was noticed, and Hiccup returned to the clinic. He was anaesthetised, and upon clipping his thick fur coat back, small puncture wounds could be seen in multiple places around the leg, and gangrene had set in. Parts of the leg had become necrotic.

Our three vets had never seen an infection move so fast. Hiccup

underwent aggressive treatment with multiple antibiotics, and the leg had to be amputated the next day.

The amputation revealed that the leg and most of the underlying muscle was gangrenous, and it had begun to spread towards the abdomen. Hazel had to remove much of the surrounding muscle, and the wound was stitched together with some difficulty. Hiccup was still in danger due to the aggression of the infection. There was a huge risk of wound break down, and possibly even sepsis and death.

Thankfully, the larger part of the infection was halted by amputation, but areas of the wound still died and sloughed away. Hiccup underwent another two procedures and finally healed after 2 months.

Hiccup was lucky enough to survive one of the most nasty infections our team had ever seen, and to this day, after many hours of research, the animal that attacked him has not been identified.
