Dental Care - as important for your pet as it is for us

Not unlike our own teeth, dogs and cats require daily dental care as well. All cats and dogs grow a set of baby teeth, which fall out around 5 months of age and are replaced by a set of adult teeth. These teeth are they only set they have, so if they are not cared for, they will fall out. Small dog breeds and cats are particularly prone to developing severe dental disease, and four out of five pets are affected at as young as two years of age. Many owners are not aware that their pet is affected. Dental disease is painful, and can lead to infection and bacteria in

the bloodstream, affecting major organs such as the heart, kidneys and liver. Signs of dental disease may include some or all of the following: bad breath, yellow/brown crust on teeth, bleeding gums, changes in chewing and eating habits, tooth loss, abnormal drooling, and broken teeth.

There are many different products you can use to assist in keeping your pets teeth shiny and clean

1. Brushing is the first most effective method, and should be done once daily using a special toothbrush and pet-friendly toothpaste. Do not use human toothpaste as you may give your pet an upset tummy.



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2. Unable to brush your dog or cats teeth? The next best products are Hills Prescription T/d, or Advance Dental food. They are fully balanced diets, and Hills T/D is the only pet food to have the Veterinarian Oral Health Council stamp of approval for efficacy in controlling plaque, tartar and gingivitis. They are available in several bag sizes and covered by a 100% money back guarantee.

3. If your pet does not like Hills Prescription T/d then you may like to try Plaque-off, an algae-based product that is added in a miniscule amount to your pets normal food. It works with their saliva to prevent the build up of tartar thereby maintaining healthy teeth and gums.

If dental disease proceeds unchecked in your pet, it may come to a point where your four-legged friends require surgical intervention to ensure the ongoing health of the teeth and gums.
